You can see sure signs of hope in those who willingly risk, those who unselfishly give, those who courageously start over.

Today, just observe what is going on around you. Pay attention to any signs of hope you see. Wherever you are, they're there. Whatever is happening, you can catch a glimpse of them.

Introductory Letter: Minister for Racial Justice

It is with great joy and God's blessings that I serve as the Minister for Racial Justice with the Justice and Local Church Ministries staff within the United Church of Christ National Office.

"Open the gates of justice! I will enter and tell the Lord how thankful I am." — Psalm 118:19

In America, the topic of race continues to be difficult to discuss in many settings. Very few Christian churches are leading bold and courageous conversations, engaging in direct social activism, and participating in civil disobedience as a way to bring attention to and disrupt racist systems and structures.


The Christian Church is the catalyst for addressing historical and contemporary issues regarding the intersections of race and racism that continue to harm communities of color. The United Church of Christ acknowledges and supports the equality of all humans. In 1993, The Nineteenth General Synod called upon UCC congregations in all its settings to be a true multiracial and multicultural church. Twenty-five years later the call continues to go forth.

The call to be a multiracial and multicultural church is an acknowledgment that racial justice means the inclusiveness of all humans and never excludes anyone based on skin color, culture, or ethnic origin. The United Church of Christ stands in solidarity with the creation narrative in Genesis 1:26-27, which clearly outlines what matters to God—all of humankind and a just world for all. God created humankind in God's image and likeness, and women and men are image bearers, sharing equal status as human beings. God did not create race, racism, superior groups of humans, and hierarchical and hegemonic social structures. God does not sanction human suffering, including America's involvement in:

- Inhumane social confinement due to mass incarceration and surveillance of communities of color.
- Global confiscation of another culture's land and resources.
- Human trafficking and the enslavement and sexual violence against women and children.
- Deportation and the separation of families from immigrant communities.
- Police brutality and militarized tactics and abuses resulting in the murder of people of color.
- Using global armaments and acts of terrorism on innocent civilians domestically and abroad.
- Supporting White Christian supremacy over and against non-Christian faith communities.

In the Hebrew Scriptures the Psalmist tells us "The earth and everything on it belong to the Lord," (Psalm 24:1), and the Gospel of John affirms what matters to God when the writer says, "For God so loved the world..." in John 3:16. Therefore the United Church of Christ believes that "God is Still Speaking" and those who believe so are called to "Be the Church" creating a "Just World for All."

The Action Center's mission is to provide an immediate and compassionate response to those in our community experiencing hardship and by offering the resources and services needed to stabilize lives and promote pathways to lasting change.



The **ACTION CENTER** (formerly "Jeffco Actions Center") is wrapping up its 50th Anniversary with a block party. They will have live music, an Art in Action art sale, and food trucks. The date is Saturday, September 14, at the Action Center Program Services building, 8745 W 14th Ave., Lakewood 80215, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Our church has been a part of this mission since it first opened its doors back in 1968. We still collect groceries and other items and deliver them to the Center at the end of every month. Every year, over 545,000 meals are provided, over 20,000 individuals are helped, and over 100,000 volunteers hours are offered. It is an excellent organization rooted in love! Their statement of core values says that they, "lead with love, cultivate compassion, listen first, then listen more, embrace new perspectives, and strive for personal growth." Wow!

The Action Center is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. \$.89 of every donated dollar serves those facing hardship or experiencing homelessness.

On Friday, September 20, 2019, communities around the world will join in a Global Climate Strike. Building on the remarkable pattern of student strikes, people of all ages will stop work, leave homes, break routines, and join together in calling for rapid action on climate justice. Eco-Justice Ministries invites and encourages people of faith to take part in the September strikes. Members of church congregations are encouraged to join the events on Friday. (A listing of strike events across the US is now on-line.)

Some recent Eco-Justice Notes have dealt with this topic:

- •A Little Child Shall Lead Them (12/21/19) -- Youth leadership of climate strikes
- •Bold Biblical Christianity (7/26/19) -- The biblical Christian faith is intimately concerned with the "worldly" events of the day.
- •Churches on Strike (8/2/19) -- outlining the two proposals for congregations to strike One of our proposals is that churches "take a strike from the Lectionary readings for the day," and draw on other voices from science and faith communities. Churches that are taking part in the Season of Creation from September 1-October 6 will already be using an alternative set of readings with a focus this year on wisdom in creation. The theme for September 22 is "Cosmos Sunday" worship planners will have to be intentional about bringing the climate crisis and the global strike into that Sunday's liturgy. Possible sources for contemporary readings (more links and text coming soon).
- Info from the Fall 2018 report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. The report is technical and cautiously phrased, so pithy and emotive quotes are hard to find. Carbon Brief has a listing of key quotes for a variety of topics.
- Here are some denominational and ecumenical statements on climate:
 - Religious Declaration of Unprecedented Human Emergency from National Religious Coalition on Creation Care
 - Sacred and Inspirational Texts and a Climate Emergency from GreenFaith
 - a listing from Interfaith Power and Light
 - a statement from <u>Episcopal bishops in Africa</u>
 - United Church of Christ resolution (2017) on "imperatives for a new moral era" -- a very similar resolution was passed by the Presbyterian Church (USA)
 - Statements from youth participants in the <u>International Congress of Youth Voices</u>
 - The "Our Children's Trust" lawsuit
 - Greta Thunberg speaks to the UN Climate Change COP24 Conference
